MAJOR THEMES AND SELECTED PROJECTS



THEME 1

"State of Exception"

- A phrase that has been used to describe the last 8 years of the Bush administration
- Refers to the spaces and times where/when basic rights that we have as citizens no longer apply

Examples:

- Guantanamo Bay/Torture e.g. Steve Powers commission
- The "black world"/hidden operations e.g. Trevor Paglen
- Wiretapping/Surveillance e.g. Jenny Polak, Jon Kessler, Hasan Elahi
- Artists being prosecuted for freedom of speech e.g. Critical Art Ensemble






Ligorano/Reese

A multi-media installation including a printed banner of Bush being informed of the terrorist attacks on 9/11, and a micro-projection (on the head of a pin) of Hollywood war films that are viewed through magnifying glass

Rachel Mason's double portrait/ self-portrait bust portrays herself and the commander in chief in an intimate kiss

Allison Smith *Hobby Horse*, 2006

Allison Smith's *Hobby Horse* was constructed in San Antonio, Texas during the fall of 2006 and was inspired by a hand-carved wooden rocking horse the artist found at a county fair in England. Blown-up to a monumental scale, the piece references the form of equestrian statuary typical in war memorials.

InCUBATE

Sunday Soup Grant, 2007-2008

InCUBATE will feed hungry visitors as part of their Sunday Soup granting program. Participants will be invited to become grant jurors for projects happening across the country and contribute to the InCUBATE "Archive of Other Options," their ongoing research into participatory structures of funding and resource-sharing for artists and arts organization.





Steve Lambert

Of the people, by the people, for the people, 2008

A drawing project where participants can re-organize the pentagon and decide how to allocate its budget

The Department of Building: 1 400 feet across. 7 floors - 5 above ground, 2 below. 6.5 mill sqft of floor space. Funding: 2007 \$439,300,000,000 (not including funds for war in Iraq and Afghanistan, ODE nuclear weepons apending, or black budget)

Curator Sofía Hernández Chong Cuy organized the inclusion of work by four international artists—Erick Beltrán (Mexico City/Amsterdam), Luca Frei (Malmo), Chu Yun (Beijing), and Magdalena Jitrik (Buenos Aires)—that will offer incisive viewpoints on the notion of democracy and some of its core principles: nation building, freedom of speech, and labor rights

Carlos Motta The Good Life, 2005-2008

Between 2005 and 2008, Carlos Motta recorded over 350 video interviews with pedestrians on the streets of 12 cities in Latin America. He presented interviewees with six questions—covering topics such as United States foreign policy, democracy, leadership, and governance—which resulted in a wide spectrum of responses and opinions according to local situations and the specific forms of government in each country.








